

- Pastoral staff work with parents and outside agencies to try to put the right support in place for all students






Start of Term Support

Key Uniform Requirements

- Plain black shoes or plain black trainers (no white soles)
- Plain white or black, ankle or knee length
- No smart watches
- No makeup or jewellery
- One small pair of stud earrings. Necklaces can be worn, but not seen.
- Students must wear their year coloured lanyard with photocard everyday.

Student Parliament; Environmental working party; Equality, Diversity and Inclusion; Form representatives and more









Google Classroom

- Students added to a google classroom in each subject
- Resources are provided for assistance during the lesson and to aid revision
- Assignments added with due date
- Work can be 'handed in'





Homework

Developing independent learners

High standards and expectations

Take responsibility for learning

- Staff are asked to keep the workload light in the first weeks
- Set according to a rota
- Mostly set on the Google Classroom
- Minimum of 3 school days to complete
- 20 30 minutes per task
- Students should not spend longer than 30 minutes on one homework task



Reporting

Reports for students in Y7 will be sent home in November (A) and April (B)

- All monitoring includes attendance, punctuality and behaviour reports and total house points
- The monitoring will also include a student's Prior Attainment Band
- Monitoring A will focus on Attitude to Learning in and beyond the classroom
- Monitoring B will include a progress report

Y7 Parents Evening (PCM) will take place in the spring term - this will be online in order to ensure flexibility for parents/carers in accessing appointments.

There will a further information event (including guided tours) in the summer term

Engagement in Learning

Engagement in Learning Score	What This Means
Great	Your child is always an active learner in lessons; they complete homework to a high standard; they are punctual and attend all lessons.
Striving to be Great	Your child is usually prepared to learn; they rarely miss homework deadlines; and they attend all lessons punctually.
Needs some Improvement	Your child's engagement in learning sometimes does not meet the standards the teacher sets out; the teacher will have already spoken to your child about what they need to do next.
Cause for Concern	Your child's engagement in the subject is of concern: the teacher has already or will be contacting you to discuss next steps. If there are three or more subjects where Engagement in Learning is a Cause for Concern, your child's Head of Year has already or will be contacting you to discuss next steps.




Progress Comments

Progress Comment	What This Means
Making excellent progress	Your child is exceeding the expectations the teacher has; they routinely extend their learning in the classroom and beyond.
Making expected progress	Your child regularly meets the teacher's expectations of where they should be based on their starting point; they regularly meet the learning objectives set out in lessons and homework.
Progressing slightly slower	Your child is making slightly less progress than the teacher expects; this means that your child sometimes does not meet the learning objective of tasks. This may be due to your child's engagement in learning.
Progress is a cause for concern	Your child's learning in the subject is of concern: the teacher has already or will be contacting you to discuss next steps.

Pupil Premium / Pupil Premium +

Children that have been eligible for Free School Meals at any time during the past six years class as 'Pupil Premium' students.

Pupil Premium Plus are children that are previously or currently in care, fostered or adopted.

The school receives extra funding for PP and PP+ students.

We allocate these funds to support educational attainment, including staff training, smaller classes, chromebooks, revision guides and extra-curricular activities etc.

Arbor Parent App

Information will be shared next week.

Access important information such as attendance, timetable, reports, praise and behaviour points and much more.

In future we are hoping to bring trips, clubs and payments on to the platform.

Work for lessons will continue to be added to the google classroom and not to the app.





Chromebooks

We believe access to ever evolving learning tools help our students to learn best.

The use of a chromebook is incorporated into the curriculum across all year groups.

We are aware that life is becoming increasingly expensive and therefore we have made spare devices available for those who do not wish to purchase a chromebook.

Parental response is overwhelmingly positive.

Chromebooks

The total cost will be approximately £250 per device - this is a major price reduction on previous years.

This includes: chromebook, charger, chrome licence, 3 years insurance & warranty

You have the option to purchase outright, or over 36 months.

PP students will be provided a chromebook by the school.

It is NOT compulsory to purchase a device.







Next Steps?

- A letter will be sent out soon with purchasing details and FAQs
- We will aim to deliver the chromebooks to the students close to half term
- There is no obligation to purchase a device;
 banks of chromebooks available for students to use



FAQs



PLEASE NOTE - Externally purchased devices <u>cannot be supported</u> here in **school** - Safeguarding, Filtering, Monitoring, Technical and Insurance reasons mean this is not possible

Who owns the chromebook?

- Parents and carers that have paid for the chromebook will own the device
- Personal accounts cannot be used with the device without specific parental requests. This ensures that we are complying with safeguarding legislation.

Tech specifications

- Handled by the IT helpdesk. It is a large order from a specified provider.


E Safety



- As part of our commitment to ensuring that we do all we can to keep our children safe online, the school uses monitoring software called Smoothwall.
- The software is linked to students' profiles and works both in school and at home on school managed devices.
- It supports students to enjoy their digital lives by monitoring the search/viewing information.
- The software flags the school if it identifies there is a potential risk of harm to students, allowing us to follow up promptly and act on any concerns.
- Filtering at school is through our firewall, just like at home via parental WiFi settings.



Use of AI - Parent Information





The ever-changing world of Al



- All is here and increasingly prevalent in the modern world.
- Many students are far more up to date with the use of AI tools than staff and/or parents/carers are.
- We need to strike the correct balance between educating our students on the use of AI, keeping them safe, ensuring that they are using AI tools in the correct way, and prepare them for the future world of work as best we are able to.
- We are working closely with Turing House and Orleans Park to ensure consistency of approach across schools in the local area.

How will students use AI?

- Students will be taught about the ethical considerations around Al in PDC lessons in Year 7 - these lessons will be offline lessons in a classroom.
- Students will be taught how Al tools work in computing lessons in Year 8.
- The use of Al tools and issues around plagiarism:
 - Students agree that they are **NOT** permitted to use Al tools to support with a piece of work unless they have been told that they can.
 - Students may <u>ASK</u> a teacher if they are permitted to use AI.
 - ALL use of Al tools must be referenced TRANSPARENCY.





How will staff use Al?

- Staff are encouraged to use AI tools to reduce their workload (e.g. support with lesson planning, producing quizzes, revision activities, admin etc.).
- Staff are clear that they must maintain oversight there is always a human being in control.
- Staff will be TRANSPARENT around the use of Al.
- Staff will ensure that no personal or private data is shared with Al models.
- If students wish to use Al tools staff will attempt to support this if possible.


